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WASHINGTON, D.C. "HILL VISITS" John F. Bradley

The Southern Crop Protection Association (SCPA) held its Washington DC "Hill Visits" to the Southern Senators' and Representatives' offices on May 7-8 to discuss major issues concerning crop production. I was privileged to represent TAPA and FBSciences along with other agricultural industry leaders from Tennessee and the Southern US.

Tennessee was represented by Michael Boden, Syngenta Crop protection (Memphis, TN), Lewis Rodrigue, Helena Chemical (Collierville, TN), Kevin Stewart, Gowan Co. (Collierville, TN), and myself. Upon arrival we received instructions, schedules and training and divided into teams. On the second day we made scheduled visits to each on the following congressional offices:

- Senator Lamar Alexander, meeting with Daniel Hale, Ag Legislative Aide
- Senator Bob Corker, meeting with Hunter Bethea and John Haley, Legislative Aides
- Rep. Diane Black, meeting with Mary Ann Ludwig, Legislative Assistant
- Rep. Scott Des Jarlais, meeting with Dayne Cutrell, Legislative Director
- Rep. Stephen Fincher
- Rep. Phil Roe, meeting with Tiffany McGuffee, Communications Director
- Rep. Steve Cohen, meeting with Michael Fulton, Agriculture Legislative Assistant
- Rep. John Duncan, meeting with Don Walker, Deputy Chief of Staff





Kevin Stewart and I teamed and discussed SCPA and TAPA's stand and recommendations of four major issues:

- Clean Water Act; Refining 'Waters of the US by EPA and Army Corps Of Engineers
- Pesticide National Discharge Elimination Systems (NPDES) General permits
- The Endangered Species Act Consideration for Pesticides
- Pollinator and Colony Health (Honey Bee Colony Collapse)

All Senators and Representatives were aware of these issues, understood them and were actively working on behalf of our recommendations and requests. In addition to our discussion of the issues we offered TAPA's broad expertise of Tennessee agriculture as a ready resource for any future questions and technical information on agricultural issues. Along with the Tennessee delegation, eight other southern states had delegations calling on respective legislators. I would be happy to share the complete platform of any or all of the issues discussed in detail by contacting me direct.

I appreciate TAPA allowing me to represent our organization. It was a good day on 'Capitol Hill'!

News from "The Hill"



Clean Water Act

The House Transportation and Infrastructure Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment will hold a hearing on the EPA/ Army Corps proposal to clarify the jurisdiction of the Clean Water Act. Last week, 230 House members signed on to a bipartisan letter demanding that the Obama administration withdraw the "legally and scientifically unsound" rule. The number of signatories suggests there could be a struggle between the House and Senate over a possible policy rider targeting the rule.

Executive Briefing, May 6, 2014

Labeling of Food Entirely or Partially Produced with Modern Biotechnology

Vermont Gov. Peter Shumlin has signed a "...first-in-the-nation law requiring that the labeling of food produced from genetic engineering ... Under the new law, food for human consumption offered for retail sale in Vermont that is entirely or partially produced with genetic engineering must be labeled to indicate this fact, as of July 1, 2016. Violators face penalties and further action by the Attorney General's Office. In addition, the bill creates a special fund to support the implementation and administration of the state labeling law, including costs and fees associated with expected challenge in court by food producers who do not want to disclose the information to consumers ..." - In response, the Grocery Manufacturers Assn. issued a statement encouraging policymakers to "...support alternative legislation that would ensure that food labels are accurate and consistent for consumers. Bipartisan federal legislation, the Safe and Accurate Food Labeling Act, HR44432, would require a label on foods containing GM ingredients if the FDA – our nation's foremost food safety authority – determines there is a health or safety risk. Any labeling of GM ingredients would therefore be based on science, not fear or the varying politics of the 50 states ..."

FIEN, May 8, 2014

House Ag Committee Chair Frank Lucas (R-OK) noted in a recent column in the Tulsa World that, "The EPA strikes again. "This time it is has created a new proposal to expand the definition of 'waters of the U.S.' for all CWA programs. Administrator Gina McCarthy claims it is to protect our precious waters and natural resources, but anyone reading what the EPA proposes, would have doubts about its intent."

Regulations

Chairman Lucas stated that, "To be clear, we are all in support of protecting previous waters and natural resources. Farmers and ranchers are especially sensitive to this effort because they rely on them for their livelihoods. But this proposed rule expands federal control of land and water resources across the nation and seemingly does so for the sake of more control. The proposal establishes broader definitions of existing regulatory categories, such as tributaries, and regulates new areas that are not jurisdictional under current regulations, such as adjacent non-wetlands. Ponds would now be included in the definition of 'tributary' and these vastly expanded tributaries would automatically fall under the jurisdiction of the EPA regardless of whether the pond is connected to navigable water, which was originally intended as the limit of federal authority."

The University of Tennessee Weed Tour will be held <u>Wednesday</u>, June 25 at the West Tennessee Research & Education Center in Jackson, TN(605 Airways Blvd).

Registration will start at 8:30 A.M. and the tour will begin at 9:00 A.M.. The tour will culminate at 12:00 with lunch in room A in the main building.

The tour will cover 60 weed management research tests in corn, soybean and cotton. Most of the research shown will be on management of glyphosate resistant horseweed and Palmer amaranth. Management of these weeds in Liberty and glyphosate based systems as well as some of the new herbicide technology traits on the horizon in corn, cotton and soybeans will be highlighted. Moreover, many of the newer premixes in corn will be demonstrated. As usual, a plot plan book will be available. UT personnel will lead the tour and be available for consultation as well as discussion of issues and product performance.

Why should you attend theses succession planning workshops? According to USDA Family Farms Overview "An estimated 70 percent of U.S. farmland will change hands in the next 20 years. If a farm or ranch family has not adequately planned for succession, it [the farm] is likely to go out of business, be absorbed into ever-larger farming neighbors, or be converted to non-farm uses."

That means, without a succession plan in place all of the hard work you put into building your farm, planting and harvesting your crops, hours spent on preserving the land, could all be for nothing.

The ASA Succession Planning Workshops are taking place near you. These one-day workshops are being held:

- June 24 at the University of Memphis University Center in Memphis, TN

The workshops are open to all soybean producers and will have a registration fee for ASA members of \$50 for the first person in a family and \$30 for each additional family member. The Tennessee Agricultural Production Association (TAPA) is a non-profit organization established in September 1996 through the merger of the Tennessee Agricultural Chemical Association (TACA) and the Tennessee Plant Food Educational Association (TPFEA).

TAPA's purpose is to promote, coordinate and disseminate information related to current recommended agricultural production practices among those engaged in research, education, manufacture, distribution and regulation of Tennessee agriculture.

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
