Hassell awarded TAPA's Outstanding Individual

What a life for Kenneth Hassell! He has served farmers devotedly for 55 years before hanging up his hat just recently. And a perfect icing on his achievement cake is being awarded Tennessee Agricultural Production Association's Outstanding Individual during the business session of its annual meeting in Gatlinburg, Tennessee on August 2, 2016.

His story in agriculture began after he graduated from Yorkville (TN) High School in 1961. He went right to work at Yorkville Gin, where he sold fertilizer and seed. In 1965 he built a bulk fertilizer house to go along with his anhydrous ammonia and custom spraying operations. In 1966 he created Yorkville Farm Supply.

In 1971 the company name became Hassell Supply Company, where he sold farm and dairy equipment, while selling fertilizer, seed, and chemicals on the side. He also ran a cotton gin for two years during this span of time. Kenneth wasn't one to sit around and watch the grass grow!

In 1980 Kenneth went to work for U.S. Steel in Yorkville which was sold a little later to LaRoach (in 1984). Kenneth was the manager of LaRoach, which later became Kaiser Estech. Later Vigoro bought Kaiser Estech. Then in the mid-90's the Vigoro name was changed to IMC. You old timers remember all the changes back then?

In 2000 Kenneth went from Yorkville to Union City (TN), his second and final location. There he became Division Operations Manager for Royster Clark. In 2005 he continued as Division Operations Manager when Royster Clark was purchased by Crop Production Services.

Kenneth has been married to the same girl for 53 years and has two boys. He had a supportive family to help him in what

became one of the greatest challenges of his life - cancer. In 1998 it was discovered that he had colon cancer and won that battle. In 2011 he developed skin cancer and won that battle, too. Last December Kenneth developed bone cancer and underwent radiation treatments. Thankfully, following these treatments he had only a very small amount of cancer detected, and not enough to undergo further treatments.

Kenneth has served on the Tennessee Certified Crop Advisor Board for six years and is currently serving as Chairperson of the TAPA Committee on Constitution and Operation Procedures.

Kenneth has not missed an annual TAPA meeting since it was formed in 1996. That's 19 years, and the attendees were glad to see him in Gatlinburg to accept this award, making it his 20th year without a miss.

On behalf of the TAPA Board of Directors and the TAPA Membership, we congratulate Kenneth for his many years of dedication to Tennessee agriculture.

How did TAPA begin? A glimpse back in time...

1996 ANNUAL MEETING REPORT

At the February 1996 Annual Tennessee Agricultural Association (TACA) meeting, members voted in Chemical favor of dissolving TACA and forming a new organization, the "Tennessee Agricultural Production Association (TAPA)." Members of the Tennessee Plant Food Education Association (TPFEA) also voted during their annual meeting to dissolve and form the new organization provided TACA voted in favor. The two boards then met and assigned a committee to put the wheel in motion toward dissolving the two organizations such that TAPA could be formed. Further investigation led to the conclusion that, due to the time frame involved in chartering the new organization and the fact that tax exempt status is becoming more difficult to obtain as well as the lengthy process, the most feasible move would be to merge the two existing organizations to form TAPA there by achieving both the federal and state tax exempt status that TACA currently holds. The by-laws and constitution of the two organizations require that this come before the membership by vote. Therefore, at our annual meeting in September TACA/TPFEA Meeting, ballots will again be circulated for voting approval of the membership of both organizations to vote in favor of the merger. The program committee has an excellent program outlined for the upcoming meeting, so mark your calendars now for the TAPA/FPFEA meeting in September.



Court Upholds EPA Decision Not to Require Labeling of Pesticide Inert Ingredients

In the latest development in a decades -long dispute, a federal court in San Francisco, California upheld EPA's decision not to pursue rulemaking that would require pesticide labels to disclose many inert ingredients. Plaintiffs first requested this rulemaking in 2006 and have since filed three related lawsuits. Last week, the court recognized that the law does not require inert ingredients to be disclosed on the pesticide label and that EPA properly denied the request for rulemaking. Plaintiffs may appeal the decision to the Ninth Circuit. Our thanks go to CropLife America on their work on this issue.

Backup Efforts to Restore the Retail Exemption Continue

Senators Heidi Heitkamp (D-ND) and Deb Fischer (R-NE) recently introduced a bill to force OSHA to scrap a July 2015 policy memo that ended the long-standing exemption of small retail stores from process safety management standards on the storage of anhydrous ammonia and require the agency to go through formal rule-making to re-interpret the exemption. Absent the impending opinion from the court, this is one of several actions designed to provide ag retailers relief.

Heads Up! Annual Brake Inspection Blitz Set for September

Inspectors will be keying in on brake safety again this September when the Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance's (CVSA) Brake Safety Week takes place September 11-17th. Across North America, law enforcement agencies will conduct inspections on commercial vehicles to look for out-of-adjustment brakes, and brake system and anti-lock braking system violations during the week. Specifically, CVSA says inspectors will

be looking for "loose or missing parts, air or hydraulic fluid leaks, worn linings, pads, drums or rotors, and other faulty brake system components." Inspectors will also be checking ABS malfunction indicator lights to make sure they're in working order, CVSA says. Defective or out-of-adjustment brakes will result in the vehicle being placed out-of-service. In 2015, 12.3% of trucks inspected were placed out-of-service during Brake Safety Week.

NHTSA Releases Agricultural Equipment Lighting Requirement

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) recently issued a final rule that will require certain agricultural equipment to come fitted with lighting and markings for increased daytime and nighttime visibility. Previously, the safety agency did not consider agricultural equipment under its jurisdiction; however, under a 2012 law, the "Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act" (MAP-21), NHTSA was forced to create the new safety standard. Under the rule, "tractors, selfpropelled and non-self-propelled" agriculture equipment must be built with lighting and markings that meet the American Society of Agriculture and Biological Engineers (ASABE) standard 279.14. NHTSA is also defining the machinery covered by the regulation using the ASABE standard 390.4. New agricultural equipment must meet the requirement by June 22, 2017; however, no retrofits of existing equipment are being required under the final rule.

DOT Delays Implementation of Unified Registration System

Last week DOT (Department of Transportation) said it is extending implementation of the final piece of the Unified Registration System (URS) to January 14, 2017 with a full compliance date of April 14th. The URS requires

new carriers to provide census and data information prior to gaining operating authority and existing carriers to update the information every two years.

It's Time to Register With ResponsibleAg

More than 2,000 facilities have registered with the ResponsibleAg Certification Program, with 255 facilities already receiving their certification. We encourage you to register your facilities today and support the program. The explosion of the West, Texas retail facility in April 2013 marked a low point in the public and regulatory agencies perception of the fertilizer industry. The industry was criticized for not having an organized effort to assist retail dealers in understanding and complying with existing federal regulations. Help is in place now. Chemical Sector Security Summit Held in Alexandria, Virginia

The 10th Anniversary Chemical Sector Security Summit in Alexandria, Virginia was held on July 19-21st. High level officials at DHS spoke, including Deputy Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas and Under Secretary Suzanne Spaulding. Director of the Infrastructure Security and Compliance Division, David Wulf, spoke at length on the past, present and future of the Chemical Facilities Anti-Terrorisim Standards program, including a study that commenced in August on chemical precursors used with improvised explosive devices. Director Wulf said the study will also inform on future changes to the Ammonium Nitrate Security Program and would take approximately a year to complete. Billy Pirkle, Senior Director EHS for Crop Production Services and Bill Qualls, Executive Director of ResponsibleAg also presented on behalf of ResponsibleAg's role of safety and security in the ag industry.

He retired last year and is currently starting his fourth year as Executive Secretary of TAPA.
