## **Remember to Keep Your Certification Up To Date!**

Private applicators have only a few months in 2020 to renew their certification. If you currently have a valid private applicator card and you would like to renew it, you will need to attend a recertification meeting held by your local county extension office. The recertification period runs from January 1, 2020 until June 30, 2020. If you do not attend a recertification meeting during this period, your certification will expire and to renew it, you would need to attend an initial private applicator training event. Recertification meetings will be held by your local county extension office or you may attend an event online. We plan to have several informative topics available to help keep you informed on current pesticide related issues. Remember, commercial applicator requirements are slightly different from private applicators. Commercial applicators are required to accrue points/CEU's to maintain their certification exam. Commercial applicators may contact the Tennessee Department of Agriculture to determine if they have accumulated the required points to roll their certification into the new certification cycle @ 615-837-5148 or they may check online at TDA's website: https://healthspace.com/clients/tda/state/weblive.nsf/pesticides.xsp

## **New Requirements for Paraquat**

In Tennessee, to use or handle paraquat products, you must be a certified applicator. In addition, paraquatspecific training is required by new paraquat labels and must be completed prior to using products with the new labeling. All paraquat labels are expected to include a link to the training by November 2019. The training provides important information about paraquat's toxicity, new label requirements and restrictions, and the consequences of misuse. The training must be retaken every three years and the training is a paraquat label requirement. If commercial applicators provide the Tennessee Department of Agriculture a copy of the certificate of completion of paraquat training they may be awarded one CEU/point credit. So make certain to provide TDA a copy of your certificate of attendance.

## **USDA Establishes the U.S. Domestic Hemp Production Program**

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue announced on October 29, 2019 the establishment of the U.S. Domestic Hemp Production Program. This program, as required by the 2018 Farm Bill, creates a consistent regulatory framework around hemp production throughout the United States.

"At USDA, we are always excited when there are new economic opportunities for our farmers, and we hope the ability to grow hemp will pave the way for new products and markets," said Secretary Perdue. "We have had teams operating with all hands-on-deck to develop a regulatory framework that meets Congressional intent while seeking to provide a fair, consistent, and science-based process for states, tribes, and individual producers who want to participate in this program."

An interim final rule formalizing the program has been published in the Federal Register that will allow hemp to be grown under federally-approved plans and make hemp producers eligible for a number of agricultural programs. The rule includes provisions for the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to approve hemp production plans developed by states and Indian tribes including: requirements for maintaining information on the land where hemp is produced; testing the levels of delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol; disposing of plants not meeting necessary requirements; and licensing requirements. It also establishes a federal plan for hemp producers in states or territories of Indian tribes that do not have their own approved hemp production plan.

The interim final rule became effective upon publication in the Federal Register last month. Following publication, USDA invites public comment on the interim rule and the information collection burden. The <u>interim final rule</u> is posted on USDA's website. USDA also developed guidelines for <u>sampling and testing procedures</u> that are being issued concurrently with this rule. These documents provide additional information for sampling agents and hemp testing laboratories. More information about the provisions of the interim final rule is available on the Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) website, under <u>U.S. Domestic Hemp Production Program</u>.
